## Federal Communications Minister Malcolm Turnbull visits Mango Hill

### to announce NBN "is a step closer"

On 12<sup>th</sup> March, Federal Minister Malcolm Turnbull visited the new "greenfield" site of Capestone (Mango Hill) to promote the roll out of the NBN and listen to views of residents from around the Federal electorate of Petrie.

Mango Hill Village residents Mitch Mayes and Laurence Christie attended to represent the views of Mango Hill residents, many of whom do not have landline ADSL or have very low speeds. Our mission: to seek a timetable for households in existing (brownfield) areas to get the NBN.

In a press release from the Office of Federal Member, Luke Howarth, Minister Turnbull stated:

*"Homes and businesses in Mango Hill and North Lakes are a step closer to getting the National Broadband Network, with build to commence on the network by June 2016. This is the certainty local households and businesses have been waiting for," Mr Howarth said. "I am pleased that after*

*months of discussion and phone calls to Communications Minister Malcolm Turnbull, I can say for sure that superfast broadband is a step closer for locals. NBN Co's national rollout plan to June 2016 includes 1,530 households in Mango Hill and North Lakes."*

In an email to Malcolm Turnbull's Office, the Progress Association has sought clarification on where those 1530 households are situated and has requested we be kept updated on more definite details of the roll out of the NBN. Our Federal Member is well aware that it remains one of the highest priority issues for this Association and our community, for both social and business needs.







# MORETON BAY RAIL UPDATE – TRACKWORK COMMENCED

Residents who attended the February meeting or the Progress Association were provided with a very informative update of both the overall Rail Project and particularly the Koala Conservation program for which the Moreton Bay Rail Link Project is receiving well deserved credit from the environmental community.

At the meeting, Koala Project Manager, Karen Mooney gave an amazing presentation on the many challenges facing the Koala along the line as well as the process of recording the separate “colonies” of the koala population numbers from Kippa-Ring to Petrie. (Sadly only 15 could be found in the general Mango Hill community.)

Karen indicated that whilst a significant number of Koalas have fallen to wild dogs in the past two years, big steps have been taken to reduce that problem. In addition many Koalas are now being saved through a break-through in medical treatment for chlamydia and there is a growing healthy population in both Kippa-Ring and Petrie areas. Karen and her team appear to have gone to amazing efforts to ensure that our furry friends have the best chance of survival.



## Temporary Closure of Mango Hill Blvd

(above Bonnet Pde)

Progress on the Moreton Bay Rail Link continues with apparent break neck speed.

Mango Hill Boulevard East above Bonnet Parade will be temporarily closed from Wed March 18 until late April. This closure is required to construct the new road surface

from Mango Hill Boulevard East on to the new bridge over the rail line. Intermittent early morning concrete pours at Mango Hill and Mango Hill East stations will continue until late this month during construction of the station platforms. Concrete trucks arrive on site between 4:00am and 6:30am. Pedestrian overpasses have been installed at Mango Hill and Mango Hill East stations. Roofing over the rail platforms has also been provided. Permanent rail corridor fencing is now being installed in the Mango Hill station precinct, work is now well advanced on the Capestone Boulevard bridge over the rail corridor and the Saltwater Creek rail bridge is all but completed. Installation of rail infrastructure (ballast, sleepers, steel rail, overhead gantries and wires) has commenced between Petrie and the Bruce Highway.



Following questions raised at the Progress meeting, Cindy Thomas (Senior Communications Advisor to Moreton Bay Rail Project) advised that: *“In regards to the lock up bike facilities, the project will be installing approximately 20 bike parking rails, each parking rail accommodates the securing of two bikes. The bike parking rails will be located in different areas of each station precinct. Petrie Station will have 10 parking rails installed accommodating 20 bikes.”*

# MANGO HILL MARKETPLACE OFFICIAL OPENING – 14<sup>TH</sup> MARCH

It's been more than three months since Coffee Club, Hogs Breath Café and Coles first opened their doors to customers at the new Mango Hill Market Place on the corner of Halpine Drive and Anzac Avenue. Since then, new businesses have

been slowly moving into the precinct. There are now 14 businesses operating from the ground floor tenancies with only 4 sites left.

The official opening of the Mango Hill Market Place was held last Saturday March 14 and it appeared to be a resounding success. By 11am there was barely a spare parking place available. Even the lower level park under Coles, which rarely gets above half capacity, was full.

There was a jumping castle, face painting, displays, free raffles, hot food, live entertainment, reptiles and more.

A particular favourite for the kids (and many adults) was the animal display by Geckoes Wildlife.

Children of all ages crowded around the tables to get a closer look. A Bearded Dragon, Blue Tongue Lizard, Frilled Neck Lizard and a Shingleback Lizard patiently allowed the kids to touch and stroke their scaly skins. Snakes, turtles, birds, a wombat and even a crocodile were also on hand.

Born Paul Blake Jenkins, Pixie is an amazing entertainer in his own right. He has his own website and Radio Program as well as being one of John Williamson's famed band of Larrikin entertainers as well as playing for many great performers over a lengthy career. Pixie Jenkins is an Australian fiddle player, singer, songwriter and entertainer referred to as “an icon of Australia's country music industry” by the Australian Newspaper. Pixie was inducted into the *Country Hands of Fame* in Tamworth in 1992 and won two

Golden Guitar Awards in 1985/1986 as a famed member of “Bullamakanka”.



It was the first election also where our very efficient and friendly staff also used electronic devices (namely scanner and computer) to record the attendance of Voters. This further reduced the chance of holding up Voters from their *extremely busy important priorities* back at home.

For the record, the Mango Hill polling booth followed the same trend as most booths in the Murrumba electorate.

# Local Resident Appointed Supervisor of Green Army Project Team.

## Work set to begin works in (OUR) bush mid-April



The Green Army is a Federal Government initiative to create jobs and to promote and enhance natural areas.

The Mango Hill Progress Association in conjunction with the Mango Hill and North Lakes Environment Group (MHANLEG) completed a proposal to begin works in the North lakes environmental reserve early this year. The proposal was endorsed by Federal member Luke Howarth and approved by the federal environment minister Greg Hunt.

Works will include weed control, rubbish removal, seed collection, native plant

propagation, water testing as well plant and animal surveys. Participants include school leavers, university graduates, long term unemployed as well as anyone interested in natural resource management between the ages of 17-24. The team aims to enhance the North Lakes Reserve's environmental assets by reducing weed infestation and planting more food and habitat trees. They will also gather valuable information to share with the community and use to create better plans in the future.

The team supervisor will be Mango Hill resident Alex Collins a long time member of (MHANLEG) and an active member of the Mango Hill Progress Association. ## PRIVATE VLAD HUNDRIC TAKES ON “THE ULTIMATE CHALLENGE”



As outlined in Mango Hill News in January, local resident, Vlad Hundric of Rose St was close to achieving his goal of becoming an Australian Soldier. It is a credit to him and Partner Trina that on 23rd January, Vlad Hundric did “March Out” with his Platoon at Kapooka (Wagga Wagga) with his head held high and his family proudly watching on. But it might never have been, but for a “throw-a-way” line from Trina herself.

• “I mentioned to him that my friend’s husband had just joined up with the Navy at the age of 52 and he was loving it. I unknowingly had ignited a passion that had been dormant within Vlad for decades. Never in a million years did I think he would do it! However the more we talked, it was evident he had a passion as it had been his life-long dream to join the services although he never taken that first big step”, stated Trina. In the end, despite the time away from family, I had to go along with it.”

### **This is Vlad’s Story!**


I was born in Marseilles in France in March 1965 just after my family fled to that country from the old “Yugoslavia”. My parents had “fallen out of favour” with the then Tito leadership who had controlled the then Balkan States (now Bosnia, Croatia, Montenegro, Slovenia and Serbia) with an iron hand since World War 2, necessitating a very hasty exit. Some two years later my parents immigrated to Melbourne.

Growing up in Melbourne I completed junior school and subsequently an apprenticeship in Carpentry. Over the next 20 years I worked in the building industry as a “chippi” before moving to drive heavy transport rigs around the country. Weekly trips would include all areas of the eastern seaboard (Melbourne to Brisbane to Sydney, Brisbane to Melbourne and everywhere in between). Then there were the long distance trips to Adelaide and across the Nullabour to Perth, all of which would take me away from family for days and sometimes weeks at a time. This is not ideal for any family despite the lure of financial gain.


Some 5 years ago in my mid-forties, I had moved to the Gold Coast and met up with Trina in late 2010. It was apparent that I had to do something with my life that would give me and my new family future stability and peace of mind. When Trina casually mentioned “her friend joining the Navy in his 50s”, the only logical decision seemed to be to join the Services (Defence Force). If successful that would provide stability, but would also demand discipline. It was to be a great challenge to “measure up” in respect of fitness and other criteria, usually attainable at a much earlier age in life.

# HAPPY 50<sup>th</sup> BIRTHDAY TO VLAD HUNDRIC 7<sup>th</sup> MARCH



## Camp Kapooka:

(For nearly 100 years, the premier recruit training venue for the Australian Army)

It was a tough journey over 2 years just meeting all of Defence force recruiting criteria, firstly trying for the RAAF and then finally enlisting into the Australian Army. I was sent to Kapooka near Wagga Wagga in southern NSW last

September, an experience that was to consume my life for the next 125 days.

What a 125 days it was. Taking on an Army Recruit Course at the age of 20 is hard enough, but at age 49, that is TOUGH. There was no allowances for age! You simply had to make it. Army discipline was there to make you or break you. However, the mate-ship and teamwork of my colleagues in the platoon was on many occasions the only reason I did make it. The amount of learning, information they “pour” into you for 15-18 hours per day is expected to be retained.

Listening to my teachers when I was young was not a priority. However, during this period, I drew great inspiration from the knowledge of my Instructors, some of whom had served Australia in theatres of war. They had Courage!

One advantage of being “older” than the average recruit, was that most (not all), did look up to me, especially as I did completed exactly the same challenges as they did (albeit a bit slower). I didn't get treated any differently which I was happy about. I also was able to give some advice on “life skills” to my younger colleagues, especially in those tough times when they were feeling the heat.

**FINAL RUN HOME:** The final few weeks were to me the most memorable! Our Platoon completed “THE CHALLENGE”, an all-day gruelling event testing stamina fitness and teamwork. This was the day after spending 10 days out in the field living on ration packs and sleeping in a hole under a hoochie. (personal army tent)

The first phase began with a 6 km pack-march with 30 kg on my back which took 48 min to complete. Then there was the 2.4km “stores carry” which included a loaded “ammo tin” placed on my pack. Then between the 13 soldiers in my section we shared 4 full jerry cans, 3 ration packs filled with concrete, 5 star pickets and a full roll of razor wire. (designed to maximise teamwork)

That was but the start of a full day of military action, that would test even an experienced soldier as they “fought to stay alive” in a sequence of real life training manoeuvres over a 24 hour period. This tested every ounce of physical and mental toughness that I could muster. “I forgot we were in the middle of summer, but just getting to the finish line was my goal. When it was done, I was exhausted numb, but overcome with emotion as I knew *I made it.*”

It was the hardest thing I have ever undertaken in my life. My mates were all proud of me as I was of them. From that point on, I was not called a Recruit but a SOLDIER. On 23<sup>rd</sup> January after a final week of room & uniform inspections and hours of parade drill practice, it was a very proud moment for me to “march out with my head held very high” with Trina, Josh and Katie watching me from the side lines.

**The Future:** Currently I am in Victoria undertaking the next phase of my training in the area of Logistics and Stores, which is a vital part of ensuring our soldiers get everything they need to carry out their role. It is also my sincere hope to obtain a posting that will allow me to spend more time with family. In closing, my message to my fellow Australians is. “**Age is no barrier.** Although those 125 days were tough, I have proven that if you put in the effort, you can achieve your dream. If I can do it, anyone can!”

**Editor's Note:** As a former Reserve soldier myself, I recognize this achievement of Pte Hundric as an amazing feat for one who is more than twice the age of the average aspiring recruit. The Australian Army has a proud record of turning out the best trained soldiers who can meet even the most challenging circumstances they are asked to undertake around the world.

Vlad has recently received word that he is to be posted to 1<sup>st</sup> Combat Service Support Battalion in South Australia. This Unit saw service on the beaches of Anzac Cove on that fateful morning of 25 April, 1915 and during those gruelling 8 months they had to defend a thinly manned line on the front losing many lives securing the beaches.

We wish Vlad well for the future, wherever it might take him and the Family!




